Dr Lance Jennings Feb 28 2018

"100 years on from the Spanish Influenza Pandemic: what have we learned?"

On the last day of February, a packed hall of U3A members were treated to a fascinating talk from Dr Lance Jennings on the Spanish Influenza pandemic of 1918 and the lessons we have learned from it.

With the support of a wide range of statistics Dr Jennings impressed upon his audience the scale of the outbreak and particularly its effect on New Zealand as the biggest natural disaster of our history. Although it has become known as the Spanish flu, just where the particular virus originated from and how it reached New Zealand remains uncertain, but there is no doubt about the toll it took, especially on our Maori population.

Dr Jennings then spent some time describing the flu virus -- or should it be viruses --- and the problems associated with finding an effective vaccine and treatment. This is made all the more difficult by the ability of various strains to

adapt and, more disturbingly, to cross from one species to another, as witnessed by the more recent Bird flu and SARS epidemics.

On the brighter side, however, the New Zealand government has established a strategy for any future outbreaks of a severe nature, including a stockpile of a variety of drugs, vaccines and the like and plans for the isolation and treatment of victims.

Finally, Dr Jennings exhorted all present to take advantage of the free vaccination programme offered to older citizens to avoid the worst effects of any flu outbreak in the coming winter

FORMER PRESIDENT WINS PRIZE

Peter Sutton, Immediate Past President of U3A Nelson, won First Prize in the Unpublished Poets Section of the 2017, Robert Burns International Poetry Competition, sponsored by the Dunedin Public Library and the Dunedin Burns Club. He learned of the competition in November, one day before the closing date. He wrote a sonnet based on Burns "Address to the Devil" that evening and emailed it to Dunedin the following morning.

He then virtually forgot about it, until he received an email in mid-December, informing him he had won and inviting to the Awards Ceremony in Dunedin, on Burns birthday, 25th January. The prize was a medal, a Certificate, \$500 and an invitation to the Burns Dinner, that night.

He, and the winners of the other two sections, were asked to read their poems at both the Ceremony and the Dinner. He thoroughly enjoyed both occasions, and on his return was asked by Page and Blackmore, to give a public reading of the winning poem, along with a few others, on the 22nd of February. These included one which will be of particular interest to U3A members.

Here it is:-

Six years ago, my wife of sixty years

Died, and devastated by this sad loss,
