FROM THE MEETING ON WEDNESDAY 25TH OCTOBER 2017

Dr Paul Taylor talk.

The U3A October meeting had a very full attendance attracted by the excellent speaker Dr Paul Taylor.

Paul a paediatrician, practiced initially with new-born children before people started coming to him with children who had behaviour problems often with aggression. This involved parents, families, pre-school and schools.

In many cases Paul diagnosed Autism Spectrum Disorder from the symptoms of rocking back and forth, and outbursts of aggression. This was initially perceived as serious and bad because of a carry-over from the past. However once Paul explained that people with autism were normal but had a different operating system, eg Apple vs Windows, it was accepted that after making allowances for this, people with autism could be easily accommodated.

 One person in 48 has autism. It is thought that there are 74,000 undiagnosed – 45,000 of these are children.

- A very high percentage of people with autism have a very high IQ.
- Autistic people have difficulty communicating because they don't read expressions or body language – only words.
- Autistic people need to know in advance, like routine and get upset at change
- Autistic people often get marginalised and ostracised which leads to extreme anxiety.

Paul spent a lot of time with schools showing how to manage this problem. From there he wrote a book 'Beginners Guide to Autism' which is easy to read and provides many tips on how to manage autism. Many schools have now become autism friendly.

Paul's presentation to the U3A meeting was considered by many who attended as probably the most enlightening and best we have had. **Bill Brett, Secretary**
