Our Speaker: Jettie Skerten

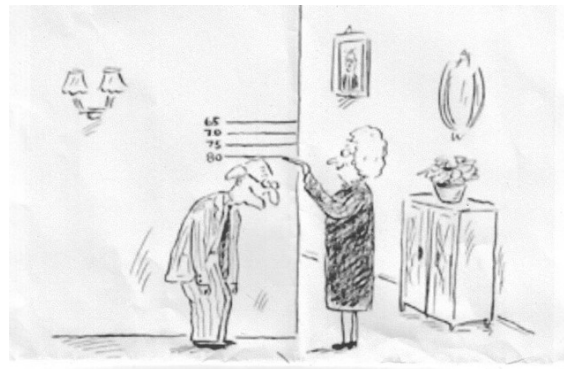

She explained some typical backgrounds of the folk who finally reach Nelson, sometimes 20 years after being forced from their original homes. Jetti started in this career after offering to help 2 refugees in Christchurch some 5 years ago. She found it rewarding and necessary, so moved to Nelson to assist here. We have a number of refugees from Myanmar and Bhutan here and Jetti told us of their needs and some of the ways we could help.

We are donating \$100 towards her work here.

To date we have looked at the 18th century origins of the present difficulties in Afghanistan, Secret Warfare, Churchill and the early Roman Republic.

Topics for our next two meetings will include Women in War and warfare as described in children's literature and we are only two months into the subject!

The Normans

The course will run from May through to September covering the invasion of Normandy by the Vikings, The men of the North, through to The battle of Hastings in 1066. Various subjects will be covered,

from the way architecture evolved through to developing the laws of the land. The wars and social life of the people are covered as well as St Michaels Mount. and the history of the region.

Altogether it shows the development of the people from barbaric invaders to assimilation and how they coped with the problems facing them both. Hereward the Wake to Queen Matilda, The Bayeux Tapestry and to King Harold. There is such a variety of topics brought up in the series which should open up lots of discussion.

Operas of Gilbert and Sullivan

A small (but very select) group meet chez Cecile Strang's to view a series of Savoy Operas - otherwise known as G&S's Ever since watching a performance of H.M.S. Pinafore staged by my sister's

boarding school, in a freezing village hall in Chagford (Dartmoor) where the academy had been evacuated during the Blitz, I have been enthralled by the paradox of Gilbert and Sullivan's oeuvre. An unlikely partnership as we all know, but equally puzzling is that these seemingly innocuous fables, set to engagingly singable music, are really subversive - every bit as much as Beaumarchais Marriage of Figaro a century before.

Under the sugar coating of the enchanting melody and witty words, a whole agenda of messages sending up inherited privilege, bogus posturing, snobbery and even (dread the thought) patriotism is hidden - and all this at the zenith of Victoria's reign.

The plots, often involving mistaken identity, baby swapping and the other equally implausible scenarios point up the radically absurd nature of British Society in its heyday of painting the world a delicate shade of Imperial pink.

I cannot help wondering how long there will be an audience for these works; but in the meantime we few, we happy few, enjoy the brilliant libretti and musical genius, as well as Cecile's hospitality.

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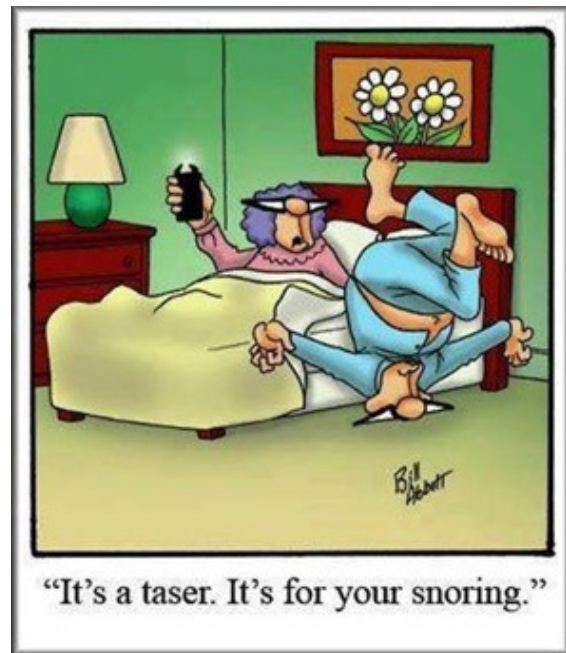
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Application to the Rata Foundation
