Our next Members' Meeting and AGM will be on Wednesday, May 1st at 10 am till 12 noon at the Nelson Golf Club, 38 Bolt Road, Nelson.

For our speaker, we are in for a treat at the AGM. Keith Hawke will show and talk of his film about Appo Hocton, the first Chinese immigrant to New Zealand. Keith has almost a lifetime in the filming business and is also the author of 'Plough Chains & Bees Arses,' (for the literati amongst us).

Cameraman turned producer Keith Hawke was born in the Otago town of Milton, and grew up in St Andrews then Christchurch. As a young man he was handed a 16mm Bolex camera and told that if he could come up with a news story that was acceptable to CHTV3, Orly would train him up as a cameraman. Hawke chased fire trucks until he found a suitable fire, then got out his camera and followed the formula he had noted from watching TV news bulletins. The footage was broadcast; the job was his.

Since then he has spent time as a war correspondent and cameraman in Vietnam, then four years in Melbourne working on documentaries and commercials. He returned to New Zealand in 1971, and began freelance work as a cameraman for Pacific Films. Then in 1974 Hawke was chosen to be chief cameraman on what would turn out to be one of the landmark television productions of that decade - documentary series Tangata Whenua, the first New Zealand television series to examine Māori life and customs.



We have a copy of his movie "Appo" about the Chinese man who became a major character in early Nelson.

FROM THE MEETING ON WEDNESDAY 27TH FEBRUARY

Dr Mike Johnston's talk was about the Permian rocks around Nelson, which includes the Nelson Mineral Belt. These rocks are found beneath Nelson, Stoke, Richmond and much of the Richmond Ranges. This topic was appropriate as our Nelson Museum has been running an exhibition called "Life before Dinosaurs - Permian Monsters".

Mike described our Permian rocks, and more importantly perhaps, what clues they held about the environments in which these rocks were laid down.

The Lower Permian rocks came from deep within the mantle and often mixed with rocks from the subducting plate. The Middle Permian rocks (the Maitai Group) have marine fossils and volcanic dust suggesting they were formed downwind of volcanic islands. The Upper Permian rocks contain basalt rocks, calcareous siltstones and sandstones and marine fossils, suggesting spreading ocean floor sediments carried along by plate movement. These latter rocks are tilted almost upright and can be seen at low tide along Rocks Road in Nelson.

It was an enjoyable and illuminating talk with quality diagrams mixed with some general local geology and social history.

The swan plants were a little worse for wear due to the drought, and having been eaten down to sticks by hungry caterpillars, but most were in chrysalis stage, ready to hatch.

Jill and Ian are well known in Tasman district for their work with the Salvation Army, but their butterfly business brings joy to many, and the releasing of butterflies is 100% eco friendly.
