Our next Members' Meeting will be on Wednesday 26th June at 10 am till 12 noon at the Nelson Golf Club, 38 Bolt Road, Nelson. The speaker is our own Bill Brett.

Bill spent his early years working for an agri-chemical company, initially in research and later in field advisory work with farmers, market gardeners and orchardists. He later moved into management in the nursery and garden industry first with Yates and then Mitre 10. For the last 15 years of his working career, he set up his own consultancy business in the nursery and garden industry with clients in New Zealand, Australia, Ireland and UK. Bill has retained a close interest in pest and disease control, regularly making submissions to the Environmental Protection Authority. In retirement he published the book 'Garden Pest & Disease Control – Essential NZ Guide'.

Bill will be speaking on 'Pesticides in our food', a subject of concern to many.

#### FROM THE MEETING ON 1st MAY

Those of you who were fortunate enough to be at the U3A AGM in May will remember this meeting! Not for the election of officers but for the most fascinating lecture from the guest speaker Keith Hawke.

Keith, a born raconteur, grew up in Milton in Otago and moved to Christchurch where he became a TV news cameraman. In the late 1960s he spent time as a war correspondent and cameraman in Vietnam then worked on documentaries in Melbourne before returning to New Zealand in 1971 to work for Pacific Films. In 1974 he was chosen to be the lead cameraman for the ground-breaking television series, *Tangata Whenua*. The 1970s also saw him adding directing to his resume: early episodes of *Country Calendar* were his.

In the 1980s Hawke reinvented himself moving to Hong Kong producing and directing television programmes before relocating to Singapore in 1989 to create a weekly television programme *Asian Business Report* and helped establish a network of production teams across Asia. He continues to work on corporate projects, both here and in Asia. He founded the Nelson short film contest. He has also written two books on his life in film one of which he sells online: *Plough Chains and Bees Arses*, an account of 25 years as a film maker abroad.


Keith showed us one of his films, perfect for Nelsonians - the story of Appo Hocton, born circa 1823. Appo jumped ship arriving in Nelson on 25 October 1842. He was the first recorded Chinese emigrant to New Zealand and eventually became a New Zealand citizen.

He began as a servant to a local doctor and through his strong work ethic became a landlord, carter and farmer. He purchased land in Washington Valley where he built eight cottages. Of those, four still stand today. In 1876 he moved his family to Dovedale and began farming. He was highly regarded as a Nelson pioneer and remained active in to old age dying in 1920. Today he has 1600 living descendants throughout the country.

There is a portrait of Appo in the Nelson Provincial Museum.

My thanks to Karen Stade: her online biography of Appo gave me many important elements of his life.

# Constitution change for setting of subscription fee.

The Annual General Meeting passed a change to Clause 6 of the constitution regarding setting of the subscription fee, which now reads- 'The committee will set the annual subscription fee by the last committee meeting of the calendar year for the U3A financial year ahead – April to March'.

Previously, the wording was unclear who set the fee and how. The committee debated this and decided to be more specific by giving the committee responsibility for setting the subscription fee, as they are accountable for the financial control of U3A. In addition, by waiting for the AGM to approve the subscription fee, we are already at least a month into the new year and groups are functioning. Members want to know the fee before committing to a group. To avoid this, we would either need to delay implementation of any change for a year after approval at an AGM or hold a special general meeting some 3-4 months before financial years end.

# Additional points following the AGM

Some members raised the issue of consultation opportunity. Rest assured, the committee is always mindful of members views. Prior to any proposed change, opinions would be canvassed at general meetings and in the newsletter. Concern was expressed by a few members that the nomination and election of the existing committee was a 'closed shop' with no opportunity for nomination from the floor being given. Whilst the wording of the constitution is a little loose, it stipulates that nominations for committee members must be in writing with a proposer / seconder, and submitted to the Secretary 2 weeks prior to the AGM. President Paul Lunberg had asked for members interested in serving on the committee to contact the president or secretary at several previous general meetings. This had also been mentioned in the newsletter. Because there were no nominations received, and the existing committee prepared to serve another year, they were elected as a block to save time.

Notwithstanding the above the committee are keen to hear from any member who would like to serve as they can always be co-opted to assist. Meanwhile, the committee plan to review the constitution to see if a wording change is required on election of the committee. Members are also invited to make submissions on this part of the constitution.

Another matter raised following the AGM, was a query as to why a not for profit organization such as U3A should hold \$16,000 cash in the bank. The Treasurer advises –

Subscriptions for the year ahead flowed into the U3A account just prior to balance date of 31 March. This balance will drop as the year progresses as we pay ongoing expenses with very little income over the next seven or eight months. At the first committee meeting following the AGM it was agreed that \$10,000 be placed on term deposit.

The U3A Nelson web site was paid for with a grant from the Rata Foundation. Web sites commonly have a life of 4-8 years, and the cost of an upgrade may well be in the order of \$10,000. Hence it is prudent to maintain a healthy bank balance.

We have a few Meetings to go and each uses money and we never know what other matter may require expense in the coming months – last year we suddenly had to pay for Indemnity Insurance and who knows this year it may be that we need to pay to get our Mailer working better?

The Mailer – perhaps I should have mentioned this first – all of us should be linked into this so that you can communicate with others in your groups. I hope to produce a picture step by step way of logging into the Mailer – once done it is easy. We are also thinking of trying to have a hands-on learning session at Senior Net – we will see how this progresses.

We have been fortunate with the golf club giving us some space in a safe location for storing some of our assets like DVDs, projector and the like. 



G arden group members had the privilege to visit J.S.Ewers tomato production glasshouses in Appleby for our monthly meeting in May.

We were shown around by David Price, Head Gardener in charge of all the glasshouse planting and production. Absolutely passionate about his work, David walked us through 6 glasshouses and gave us a very full explanation of the whole operation. Second largest tomato grower in NZ and largest producers of indoor and outdoor crops in NZ. A wonderful story is on the JS Ewers website, but aged 15, John Ewers joined his parents growing in the productive soils of the area, without the luxury of irrigation, manually watering by hand. 1972 saw the Ewers family purchase the Blackbyre Road property. 1983 introduction of indoor growing in plastic houses, adding the ability to warm the soils and begin producing wonderful flavoursome tomatoes, a product the company is now highly regarded for, selling to most supermarket chains. Use of technology further added to the expansion of this operation, including in 2001 hanging gutter technology taking production and product quality to new levels. Further expansion has continued with the involvement of MG Marketing, and the amount of jobs increased, seeing between 140 - 200 people employed, depending on the time of year. A very successful local company who also have a Church building on site, and help workers learn English.
