FROM THE MEETING ON 26th February

ur speaker was Bruce Vander Lee, the project director for Project Janszoon. Having grown up in Iowa USA, Bruce didn't see the ocean until he was 17 years old. He is now project director for Janszoon, a privately funded trust set up to restore and preserve Abel Tasman National Park's rich wild-life for all to enjoy. It is a team effort involving conservationists, iwi, locals, scientists, tourism operators and volunteers.

'Janszoon' was the second name of explorer Abel Janszoon Tasman. The project was launched in 2012 with generous support of New Zealand couple Neal & Annette Plowman, who have since established the \$100million philanthropic NEXT Foundation. Project Janszoon has committed millions over 30 years to make transformational change in Abel Tasman National Park. Project Janszoon is



unique—this was the first time philanthropists had offered to partner with a government department to restore the ecology of a national park.

The trust aims to reverse the trend of ecological decline in the park. 'We are working with iwi, the Department of Conservation (DOC), and the community-led Abel Tasman Birdsong Trust, to put things right. Together we're getting rid of pests and weeds, bringing back native birds and bush, and inspiring a culture of care for Abel Tasman'.

Bruce outlined the work being undertaken on a broad front.

Attacking the problems—rats, stoats, possums, goats, weeds, wilding pines.

Restoring habitat, encouraging bird life and introducing others. All this work going on simultaneously to a well-prepared plan. Progress is closely monitored and measured.

The result is—considerable progress in just a few short years.

Following the overview, Bruce took us through two examples illustrating success.

The brown teal duck, now spread over a wide area near the coastal wetlands, and the Kaka which is spread widely over the park. Female Kaka, were introduced to mate with the few remaining wild males. Further releases were made, but Bruce pointed out that it is easier to protect what we have than to put back what has totally disappeared.
