Our next Members' Meeting will be on September 23rd from 10 am till 12 noon at the Nelson Golf Club, 38 Bolt Road, Nelson. The speakers are Tom and Vicky Jackson and the title of their talk is 'Living on a yacht for 35 years and Cruising the World's Oceans'.

Tom and Vicky define the word "sailors", both learning to sail as children and continuing since then, and living afloat continuously from 1978 until 2013. Their second yacht, the 39' sloop 'Sunstone', despite being a 'house-boat', also proved competitive for them, racing offshore and winning the 1985 Channel Race overall and her class in four of the eight Fastnet Races, along with other successes since.

In 1997 Tom and Vicky took early retirement from their senior teaching positions. Two weeks later they sailed away from the UK to begin world cruising. They have crossed the Atlantic twice and the Pacific Ocean six times, five of those between New Zealand and Alaska. Their six-year circumnavigation was eastward, taking in the five great southern capes, but also reaching 61'N and 57'S.

When not cruising, they now live in Nelson.

Bill Brett honoured with Horticulture award!

Bill Brett has a long, wide ranging and distinguished career in horticulture. This was recently recognized, with the Associate of Honour award of the Royal NZ Institute of Horticulture.

Following graduation from Massey, he worked in field research, then moved into technical advisory roles, initially in agrichemicals, then later for Yates. Retail beckoned and following a brief period with Botanix garden centres, he was approached by Mitre 10 NZ to set up the garden division which he managed for 5 years. In 1995 Bill set up his consultancy and training business and soon had many nursery and garden centre clients in NZ, Australia, Ireland and UK.

Simultaneously with the above Bill was also the technical partner in a large kiwifruit orchard. He served on the board of the Nursery & Garden Industry Association for 12 years, 2 as president.

In retirement in Nelson, Bill has authored a book on Garden Pest & Disease Control and has 2 more books close to publication. Bill is self-sufficient in vegetables from a small backyard. Until recently, before downsizing, he was also self-sufficient in fruit.

Sixty years a gardener and working in the gardening industry, Bill has a lot of knowledge he loves to share.

Scrumpy Scroodles

1/4 cup (55 grams) chopped bacon
1 cup (125 grams) grated cheese, preferably Tasty
1 pkt Onion soup mix
1/2 cup (65 grams) flour
1/2 tsp baking powder
1 x 250 gram pottle sour cream – Traditional not Lite

Mix all ingredients together and put spoonfuls in mini muffin trays

Bake 20 mins or until golden brown at 180 degs C

Note: the quantity can be doubled. Recipe makes approx 24. They freeze well.
