(On 12 April 1980 President William Tolbert was overthrown and murdered in a violent coup at a beach). We were privileged to have Sandy talk to us and were uplifted by her public speaking and humour.

Setting up a new group

elow are a few things to consider when setting up a new study group. This is not at all a mandatory list. Like Roger Pittman's article you saw earlier, it's meant to take the worry out of becoming a convenor.

Topic

Be sure to choose a topic for which you have strong enthusiasm, not just a passing, lukewarm interest. The first couple of meetings might well depend on your energy and input.

Have a clear picture of what the group is about, any parameters that matter, possible constraints and the like, whilst at the same time allowing for the natural evolution of the group as it progresses.

Write a short description for the website so that potential members know what they're signing up for and of course to advertise the group.

Give some thought even to the name of the group to reflect the content/activity/angle and to attract participants.

Venue

Many groups meet at the venue of the convenor, but by no means all. There's no reason why there can't be some kind of rotation if that's what members want. And of course, the nature of the group might well require a different venue every time e.g. gardening, walking, nature studies.

Times

Convenors usually set day(s) and times when they first offer a new group -- we're all busy after all. But some convenors renegotiate times and days at the first meeting to suit participants. Some days, of course, are more popular than others and so likely to cause clashes for possible members. I can give some guidance about that but there's not a lot I can do.

Numbers

You need to establish a maximum for your venue, how many your sitting room, say, can comfortably accommodate. If there are several venues, you would have to go with the constraints of the smallest, not the largest. It may also be helpful to have in mind a minimum below which the group might not really be viable.

Technology

Many groups make use of technology of one kind or another, TV with Youtube and such websites, DVDs and others. If your group is going to depend even to some extent on tech, is yours reliable --- waiting can be a killer.

Programme

Planning the content of sessions sounds daunting, but is really not so difficult as it appears. In the first session, groups usually discuss and settle on a programme at least for several meetings and usually different members take responsibility for preparing and running a session. Some topics e.g. language learning, don't fit quite so easily into that kind of democratic approach, but in general, the more interactive sessions are, the more enjoyable they will be.

Convenors' responsibilities

The U3A Nelson website, https://www.u3anelson.org.nz/, has a page outlining the responsibilities Convenors have when running groups, so there is no point in repeating those here.

<u>First steps</u>

Email me with your proposal and I will spread the word among members. You can also take advantage of General meetings where you can give a short plug to members present --- past experience, however, suggests that there will be fewer than 100 people there so you will not reach even half of our active members that way. I then enter the group on the system, advertise it among the membership and keep you posted about numbers.

Finally, I'm always here at the other end of the keyboard in case you get stuck or need any advice or help.

Group Reports

Galleries Group

The Galleries group is a new group and at this point we have had three meetings. It's a small group, but with room for 2 or 3 more members. We meet on the third Thursday of the month at 10 am at the home of one of the group.

The group is for people interested in world galleries, whether art, or museums in general. The focus of the group is: to share knowledge and information about various galleries of the world including NZ. We would hope that some/most/all of the participants in the group will be able to share their experiences of having visited particular galleries as well as complementing their experience with the rich resources available online and from their own photographs. However, those who have not visited galleries, but who are interested in this group are also welcome to join.

The three sessions we have held so far have been fascinating. The first session looked at Leonardo Da Vinci's masterpiece, The Lady with Ermine, and the Princess Czartoryski museum in Krakow, Poland where the painting is hung. The second session involved a visit to the Suter Gallery and a guided tour by the director, Julie Catchpole and her talk about the Kelleher Art prize winners exhibition. The third session was about the Kroller-Muller Museum in the Netherlands, an amazing gallery, which most of us knew little about. We also looked at a video about a famous Hans Holbein painting, The Ambassadors, which is in the British National Gallery.

Some of our 8 members were new beginners, the others, "I played a long time ago and have almost forgotten". Graeme is our most experienced player, and advisor on rules.


It's an ideal U3A "Shared learning" group. No-one sits out, and we all learn by doing. We are all teachers and learners, and fortnightly games are improving our memory skills, helping learn strategic forward thinking, learning to be bold & assertive at the same time as defending our key pieces, ("Watch your back!), learning how to win - "That's Mate!" - and also accept defeat.

Each session warms up our "chess" brains with a short group activity trying to solve the latest Listener Chess problem, – even beginners gradually learn the notations.

Then, if we have an even number of players we settle in to games which might last the rest of the morning, with a break mid-morning for a cuppa. There is no "ladder" to denote hierarchy of ability; we all get to play each other over the months.

If we have an uneven number of players we play a "round robin" with timed games of 15-20 minutes with one person taking a break, then we all move on to another board. The fun part is picking up and continuing a game that other people have started.

Yes, we are serious at learning chess to help wake up those ageing neural pathways. But we also enjoy our mornings with each other's company, have a laugh and maybe time for "solving the world's problems" over Convenor Diane's tea and coffee.
